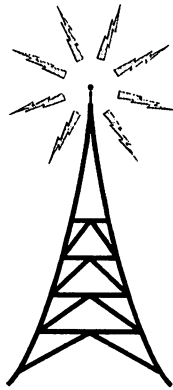

Post Script-Death of a Dear Friend

On April 3rd, thousands of Atlantans lost a very dear and beloved friend when WGKA signed off for the last time as the child of Joe Webber. This station was either loved or hated because of its quirky format, but it gained probably one of the most loyal listening audiences of any radio station in the area. I happened to have been one of those who truly loved the station. I had nearly every radio in my house that was working tuned in to 1190 on the AM dial as well as all of my car radios. There was no other radio station in the metro Atlanta that played music from sun up to sundown. There was something for everybody. If you didn't like a piece or a particular type of music, then you just waited until the next selection. Joe Webber had a great sense of humor, and he would compose all sorts of vignettes and characters that would have you laughing. He was really inventive and had a very good supporting cast. It was certainly a very special radio station that was probably unique in broadcasting today anywhere.

When I heard that Joe Webber had decided to sell his station, I went through wide range of emotions; disbelief, hurt and anger. It was because of those feelings that I realized how much that I let WGKA become part of my life. I listened to it every day that I was in town. Including Joe Webber

I had come to meet and know most of the DJ's and staff, including Joe Webber. I probably became one of the stations biggest boosters and I had even come to appreciate and enjoy the variety (others say quiriness) of the musical format. I realize that the radio station was a sentimental whim of Joe Webber who had enough disposable income to buy the radio station and run it for pleasure. I don't know if he ever made a profit, but I feel like he was approaching that level as his loyal fan base was growing rather rapidly. I know that his overhead must have increased over the last few years as he hired some very competent staff such as Station Manager Mike Rose and DJ Lee Garen. But still, I truly believed that he was doing all of this because he really enjoyed it and had the financial resources to continue. So it was a shock to me when he decided to sell out to a very large offer and to give up his dream (and mine). I can't always fault a man for selling out a principle for an offer he couldn't refuse (obviously) but I thought that Joe Webber was somehow above this. And to even rub salt into the wound, He not only sold off his station, but he sold out the format of the "Voice of The Arts". For a man that didn't want his staff to play Christmas music around the holidays, what did he do but but sell out to a Christian Network that plays "Solid Gospel". I happen to be a Christian person, but I can tell you that I can't stand the new WGKA. It is awful. So I leave 1190 AM with some bitterness and anger that has turned Joe Webber from a hero into a villain. He has betrayed my loyalty and I feel at a loss. And yet, as I said in a last minute e-mail to Joe, that I still admired him as a person, but I was angry with him for what he did for the loyal fans of WGKA. Oh well, I'll survive, and hopefully something else will turn up that will fill the void, but at least I feel better about paying my last respects to the "Voice of The Arts", and getting my feelings off my chest. It was great while it lasted.

A tribute to Bill Johnsons late wife

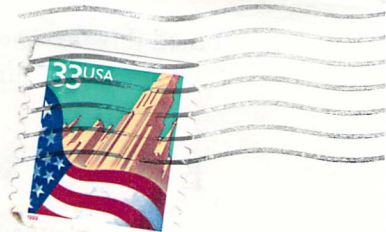
