Almost 3 million points fm 39 qsos and 8 rigs. **Res Ipso Loqitor!**



The Amazing and Magical TV-7 Tube Tester

Although I have never actually purchased any tubes on eBay, (tubes seem to show up at my door unannounced). I often look at auctions and the highest priced tubes always have data from testing with a TV-7. The TV-7 is a Hickok design that was upgraded to meet military specifications and built with the best components, switches, wiring and sockets available. Packaged in a tough metal case with (at least when new) waterproof seals, these units seem to survive and prosper while the civilian counterparts give way to rodents, moth and ruin. I got the TV-7 bug after asking a tubeseller at the Shelby Hamfest what those numbers like 67/47 meant on his tube boxes. He said that TV-7 test results are read on the meter scale of 0-to-120. 67 was the test result, 47 was the minimum value for a successful test. That was all I needed to begin my search. Not long after, a fixer-upper TV7/U appeared under a bench at the 2003 SARS winter meet in Winder. The price was right and my pockets needed emptying after selling a restored Transoceanic for what amounted to \$0.24 per hour of my restoration labor. It needed some cleaning up and insulating of a broken acorn socket that was rattling around in the case and it was good to go. Then I started watching eBay auctions for TV7* testers and saw some near-mint ones going for \$500 plus. I think the demand is driven by audiophiles who are convinced that their equipment has improved sonic properties after their expensive Globe 45 tubes are soothed and healed by laying on of TV7 hands...

One night I posed the following question to the rec.antiques.radio+phono newsgroup: "What are the top 10 reasons for owning a TV-7?" Arizona Cowboy wrote:

- 10. Looks Good on the shelf next to your other surplus military gear
- 9. More data available than any other tester (over 4000 tube types)
- 8. Dan Nelson calibration (Dan is the acknowledged TV-7 calibration guru).
- 7. More rugged than any other tester, impervious to shock & rain
- 6. Ceramic switches, sockets, NASA grade resistors used throughout (Did Apollo 11 have tubes?)
- 5. The most reliable tester, you can't break them
- 4. Will stay in calibration for 10 years
- 3. Looks way cool
- 2. High resale value
- 1. The only mil-spec built Hickok

Other posters added their comments and of course disputed each of the opinions of others. If you do a Google search on "TV-7 Top 10" you can follow the entire discussion.

What I like most about this instrument is it's compact size and the fact that there is great documentation on the internet (bama.sbc.edu) for tube settings,



calibration and maintenance. Nolan E. Lee has done extensive research on the TV-7 and has a website with a spreadsheet showing the settings for thousands of tubes

http://www.acadiacom.net/nlee/tv-7_index.html I put a laptop next to my TV-7 and wrote a spreadsheet macro to search for a particular tube. Any TV-7 model will test most radio tubes.
